ROOTS, RACE, AND DISCIPLESHIP



Every Monday lunch is available to anyone who comes by FUMC looking for nourishment. The team typically hands out 65-75 meals ranging from sandwiches to baked chicken or meatloaf with as many fixings as



we can fit in a to-go container. We also provide a bag with a sweet and a crunchy/salty such as chips or granola bar and whatever utensils are needed, plus a bottle of water. If we can get fruit, we provide that as well. We also hand out smiles, good wishes, and prayers (even if they can't be heard by the human ear). Lunch is available at other churches in the city throughout the week.

My name is Chris Roehl and I, personally, help with this ministry mainly because I am called to be God's hands and feet in this world. I could choose to hand money to the panhandlers I see regularly. It's quicker & easier, but I'm always conflicted about whether I am really helping or just supporting an addiction. I don't feel that conflict when I am feeding people a meal.

Even though most of the people we feed are homeless, some are not, but are living close to the edge. Not having to pay for food can make all the difference in their lives. If we, through this ministry can keep even one of those close to the edge people from falling, then we are providing a useful and a necessary service. I thank God that FUMC is willing and able to be a part of that service. I also am grateful that other people are willing and able to be a part of this ministry. I can't and don't provide the meal alone. Thanks to all the volunteers that take part in this ministry!

In the hymn "Here I Am Lord," God asks "Whom Shall I Send?" and we reply:

Is it I, Lord? I have heard you calling in the night. I will go, Lord, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart.

Helping to feed people is what I have heard God calling me to do. It is how I hold his people in my heart.

First United Methodist Church member Mark S. Chapman is a native of Northern Virginia, and graduated from George Mason H.S. in 1967, from



Furman University in 1971 with a B.S. degree in Physics, and from Clemson University in 1973 with a M.S. degree in Physics. After graduation, Mark served on active duty in the US Army as a commissioned Signal Corps Officer for several years and afterward served as a Defense Department physicist for 30 years until his retirement in 2004. Mark married Susan in 1976 and they have two beautiful daughters: Tara and Rebecca.



Just before retiring from a career in physics, a hilarious encounter with a squirrel in church sent this former veteran on a new path: a mission to learn the craft of stained-glass windows. His lifelong passion for art

and his quest to embark on a new creative endeavor was the birth of his company Art Glass Windows in 2000. Check out the company website: www. artglasswindows.biz. Mark designs, constructs, installs, repairs/restores and installs stained glass for windows, doors, transoms, side-panels, and skylights in private and commercial spaces and places of worship. In 2011, he created the Prodigal Son Returns window at FUMC.

The exhibit at FUMC shows prints of ten original Masonic paintings completed in 2021, and it is interesting to note that Mark is the only artist ever to create paintings of the 6 Royal Arch degrees. Mark labels each print and sells them to fundraise for the Masonic Home of Virginia retirement home in Richmond and for dementia and Alzheimer's patients. He actively supports the annual Charlottesville WALK to



End Alzheimer's by organizing a Team that raised over \$54K since participation began in 2010. Several FUMC members support his Team!


Room 208 will get wood floors refinished and the room painted beginning January 28. The room will be unavailable for about three weeks while the work is under way.

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NOTES FROM PASTOR ALEX LOVE THE WHOLE CITY & LOVE THE CITY WHOLE

I've been praying a question since I moved back to Charlottesville last summer to become pastor of First UMC: Where is God leading us in this time and place? Maybe God is leading us... to the park.

First Church has gone through a lot of transition. Inperson services have restarted but we moved from three services to one. The church got a new pastor (me) but there was only one pastor now instead of two. And in the recent past there is the memory of traumatic events like the rally of 2017 and the debates over human sexuality at the United Methodist General Conference in 2019.

So I have been listening. You welcomed me into 12 different sessions where I asked some get-to-knowyou questions and vice-versa. I reported back on that during services in the mid-fall. I had an onboarding session with the Church Council and staff in August where I learned more of the history of the church, including some visioning work and a survey that was done just before the pandemic.

We had a book study of Kay Kotan's *Being the Church in a Post-Pandemic World*. I've asked questions in making pastoral visits. And we've had a series of conversations with community partners like Loaves & Fishes, The Haven, Congregation Beth Israel, the Charlottesville Clergy Collective, Live Arts, and many others. We formed a vision team.

I learned a lot about the values of the church, the things that made us proud about First Church, and our hopes. I also learned about the city.

The city of Charlottesville is a vibrant, wonderful city but its people are hurting. When it comes to issues like homelessness, race relations, city governance, and affordable housing, we see the challenges. We are struggling to tell a new story about what kind of place Charlottesville is and what our common hopes are. The pandemic has left many people isolated and disconnected and searching for meaning.

The church has also felt the impact of these things and shares some of the same challenges. Meanwhile, the park right across the street, that came into being at the same time our predecessors built this building, is both a reminder of the pain and an open space at the center of the city.

What if we claimed this space and time? At a time when the city and the church are searching for new life, what if we listened for God's voice in the midst of that? We are *both* looking for an inclusive story that will be good news

for all the residents of the city. We can reclaim our mission and identity by renewing our commitment to love the place where we are.

The vision I've been rolling out in our January worship is: **Love the Whole City and Love the City Whole, Starting Right Here.** It's a vision of rededicating the park as a place of community healing and flourishing. And in the process we will develop partnerships with other community groups, identify the assets of the church and community for developing responses to needs like homelessness, encourage the arts community, and find our mission in giving ourselves to the place where we are.
